The Vatican Film Library supports the research of scholars using its manuscript collections through a fellowship program made available by the generosity of the Andrew W. Mellon Foundation. The Vatican Film Library Mellon Fellowship provides the cost of travel within the continental United States and per diem expenses (currently \$73) to researchers making use of the collections for periods between two and eight weeks.
